President's Report (from the AGM 20th September 2019)



Well it has been quite an exciting 12 months with mainly highs and the occasional low. Much to our surprise just after last year's AGM we learnt from Banyule City Council that we were getting a new kitchen at our History Resource Centre as part of its maintenance programme including hot water being provided to the sink adjacent to the toilets. Work occurred over the Christmas/New Year period at the same time a sagging ceiling was to be repaired but it was found that timbers in the ceiling had been eaten away by termites and if they were there they must have destroyed the ones in the wall as well so the roof and walls had to be repaired even before the kitchen was started.

Unfortunately, due to some of the building works we got flooded and almost 200 of our book publications were damaged. Book sales are down, however this should pick up as Christmas approaches but we are still getting our presence felt with talks and walks to schools and community groups as well as input into the local paper and Council's Banner.

Thanks to a grant from Federal Government we have been able to purchase two new laptops to replace two of the aging desktop computers and we thank our Federal member's office for its support.

The Society for the second time recently won an award from Museum Victoria for our input into its Victorian Collection and cataloguing excellence by a voluntary organisation for which our Thursday contributors can be most proud, particularly Sue Ballantyne, Merilyn Mullavey and Peter Simmenauer for their cataloguing.

Peter Van Eeken is progressing well with the history of this area and though we were expecting one volume he has enough material for three.

Membership is continually growing and monthly meetings well attended as well as our coffee mornings and open days thanks to Sue Brenkovich and Dawn Bennetts for their promotion and organisation.

If you have attended the History Resource Centre you will have noticed we are running out of room and Banyule City Council has allocated funds this year to investigate how best to extend and modify the building to facilitate additional space for our Thursday crew.

The NBN is now available to the Resource Centre so we are comparing deals - speed versus price, fortunately the annual heritage grant Nillumbik Shire Council has been allocating to us goes a long way towards having access to the internet without which we couldn't function.

We couldn't survive without support from various authorities and our thanks go to Banyule City Council, Nillumbik Shire Council, Greensborough RSL, Greensborough Chamber of Commerce, Greenhill's Neighbourhood House and State and Federal Governments and Yarra Plenty Library Service all of whom have played an important part in making us a successful Historical Society.

Closer to home you have a hard-working team of Committee and lay people, each contributing their precious time and I am most grateful for their support over the past 12 months.

Resident Ladies on the Plenty River – 1842 Petition

A petition is the most basic of means for citizens to request action by a higher authority, often government. The right to petition the Federal Parliament has been one of the rights of citizens since Federation, and it is the only way an individual can directly place their grievances before Parliament.

While we live in an age of instant on-line petitions for many causes, petitions have traditionally been a collection of signatures on paper or fabric, with the request stated at the beginning.

1891 Women's Suffrage Petition

Victorian women can proudly claim an early milestone with the 1891 Women's Suffrage Petition. Tabled in Parliament in September 1891, the petition requested that 'Women should Vote on Equal terms with Men' and collected nearly 30,000 signatures. It reflected the dedicated work of a handful of women who travelled across Victoria, going door to door to collect signatures, pasted the pages onto fabric and wound them onto a large spool. Its tremendous length earned it the name of the 'Monster Petition'. It played an important role in the women's suffrage movement, with Australia being the first nation to give women the right to vote and to stand for parliament, with Federation in 1901.

The Monster Petition is housed in the Public Records Office of Victoria as one of the State's archival treasures. In 2006, through the work of the Genealogical Society of Victoria, the Royal Historical Society of Victoria, the Public Record

Office Victoria and the Parliament of Victoria, the Petition was transcribed and developed into a database which can be searched by name and

While there are no signatures for Greensborough and only a few for Diamond Creek and Heidelberg, it is well worth checking if any of your female ancestors were signatories.

1842 Petition from the Resident Ladies on the Plenty River

Several years ago, I was intrigued to see the 1842 Petition from the 'Resident Ladies on the Plenty River' which came to my attention courtesy of the Essendon Historical Society. It's a unique document and a special window into our early local history.

Dated 5 May 1842 it is addressed to his Honour CJ La Trobe Esquire and requests protection and support for settlers, from bushrangers as follows:

Sir,

We the resident ladies on the Plenty River and the surrounding neighbourhood having received such a shock by the late brutal attack of the bush rangers on our lives and property feel no longer sufficiently safe to remain so far from Town, unless some urgent means are adopted to prosecute and put down these constant outrages.

We most respectfully solicit your Honour to support the Settlers, aided by those who so gallantly risked their lives for our protection from the late emergency, to unite in carrying out the spirit of these Petitioners.

The handwritten petition and matching signature show that Anne Bear wrote the petition and was the first signatory. The original letter is difficult to read but the signatures are much clearer.

Many of the other signatories are familiar pioneer settler names in the region – Beale, Coulstock and Flintoff, with some roads bearing their names - Bond, Cooper, Haley,

McLean and of course Bears Castle at, and the Sherwin Ranges beyond Yan Yean Reservoir.

The petition was indexed by historian Lenore Frost, with a synopsis of the circumstances leading to the petition.

Young Men on Fast Horses

The petition was collected shortly after the capture of the Plenty Valley Bushrangers, amid fears for settler's safety and property. Indeed, Anne Bear and her teenage daughter Ellen were raided at their farm in Yan Yean by these bushrangers on 29 April 1842, stealing money and food, while her husband John worked in town. They went on to raid more properties in the Upper Plenty Region before being cornered in a hut near Whittlesea on 30 April, by a posse of 'gentlemen' from Melbourne.

During the ensuing gunfight, the gang leader, 27-year-old John Williams was killed and one of the posse was seriously injured. The others, Martin Fogarty aged 18, Charles Ellis, 19, and Daniel Jepps 27, were captured and brought to trial before Judge John Willis. They were found guilty and hanged on 28 June 1842.

In the petition the pleas of the Plenty River Ladies are strong and earnest. One can only imagine the hardship and isolation they endured, then the additional burden of fear of violence and assault against them and their children, especially their daughters.

I think it amazing that the women have organised this petition - perhaps they signed it at church or a community event, or maybe someone took it to the various homesteads on horseback. The signatures are nearly all in their individual handwriting.

It's not surprising that the petition has a strong law and order agenda and indeed the women's voices were presented to Superintendent La Trobe, as part of a wider campaign to form the Port Phillip Volunteer Militia, to protect outlying settlers. However, La Trobe and Governor Gipps in NSW were not convinced of the wisdom of this, fearing a difficult to control

'vigilante' force and the potential for attacks on Indigenous people and it was never formed.... and Anne Bear's husband employed a mason to build Bear's Castle for protection.

Lindsay Mann from Whittlesea Historical Society has also written a book on them titled *The Plenty Bushrangers of 1842.*

However, I am drawn back to the petition and the lives of these 'Ladies'.

The Plenty River Ladies

I have no doubt there are many stories in the names of these petitioners and believe it would be great to research and give recognition to the lives of these pioneer women. Indeed, we will have information on some of the women, such as Flintoff's in our archives, while others will be harder to track down. The research can then be collated and uploaded to our web page.

This has been done with some of the signatories of the Women's Suffrage Petition, with a wiki format enabling people to add information, often to the delight of descendants. And I note four of the Diamond Creek Suffrage Petition signatories were Haley's - Ann J, Ada and R. & A. Haley - perhaps the children and grandchildren of our Plenty River petitioner Jane Haley?

Upcoming Events


Greensborough Historical Society has a very busy month in **October**:





Heritage Day


our next meeting Saturday 26th October 2019
